Living in the Forest: Insects, Disease and Wildfire: Thursday April 18th

Holly McKenzie, DNRC Service Forester at Flathead Unit, a DNRC Service Forester available to the public for private property visits to assess forest health, wildfire risk, tree thinning needs, and weed recommendations.

This talk is designed to touch on basic forestry information centering around forest health, tree thinning to increase resiliency to wildfire and insect/disease issues we commonly see in our area. We'll also talk about transitions to forest cover which includes planting, scarification, and tree thinning to adjust sunlight and moisture needs. Grizzly and black bears, mountain lions, and wolves roam western Montana on landscapes with chickens, cows, sheep, garbage, beehives, fruit trees, pet and livestock food, grain, and more. When large carnivores overlap with these attractants, conflicts can happen. We will discuss nonlethal strategies and resources to reduce conflict with large carnivores to keep people and property safe and carnivores wild.
